SYNOPSIS OF SEPTEMBER 19, 2019

LUNCHEON PRESENTATION

Chandra Alston, Associate Vice Chancellor of HR and Dan Harder, CIO,

What brought about the email decision? It has been being researched for the past 4-5 years. There are two major areas of concern. Probably the most essential is security.

There are a lot of UT accounts out there for retirees. 900 + newsletters are mailed to retirees, but there are more not in this group that are in the cyber-world. These can be accessed by others if passwords are not secured and changed regularly and if training is not done on a regular basis. Users click on something that contains a virus which will invade computer and can then invade the UT system. Do retirees click on these? Yes. Do employees click on these? Yes. But it is easier to check on employees' email and take that account off the network because they are on campus.

Training takes place on campus and if an employee does not take it their netID is cut off with a notice that when the training is completed it will be restored. For retirees it is more difficult to reach them; they may not check their email regularly to see a notice; phone numbers are not always available or have been changed or disconnected; some employees have not checked their email since they left the campus.

The second area of concern is cost, although this has less impact than security. If you have looked at new emails recently, you will notice many things are now being "nested" in the program. Microsoft decided to nest programs such as Word, Excel and PowerPoint for example so that when a company purchases Outlook, they can have access to these and the Cloud. At one time the cost of the email program was about \$1.00, now the cost is \$9.00 to \$12.00 for each account to be activated. If you multiply that by 900 it is costly for accounts not being used or accessed with regularity. So this is part of the decision.

When email first became available (Netscape), people had difficulty obtaining personal email accounts, so started using work email for everything. Later, many companies started offering email, but UT needed to be connected to employees and retirees, so had to have accounts.

If you are still connected to UT, departments can still sponsor you if you have a reason to be connected to a department or a group that is going to keep you monitored.

A survey was sent out, meetings were held with some people, but maybe not enough. Dan will check on why the announcements did not reach everyone.

Knoxville is exploring what they are going to do about their retirees. They have very different data sets from UTHSC. We have an academic health focus which has to include protecting health information, HIPPA. UTHSC has five security IT people dedicated to our environment; Knoxville has one. Our ecosystem is very different compared to the undergrad side in Knoxville. On the day of this presentation Knoxville had 97comproised accounts. Some of these attempted to compromise UTHSC, but our IT team blocked the attempts and cut off all connections. The Risk/ Tolerance factor for undergrad accounts compared to UTHSC is very different. ONE compromised account could expose UTHSC to lawsuits because of the Protected Health Information Act. Our data is very different from the other campuses.

How does one get general announcements, such as the Daily Digest? The Daily Digest area is on the UT website under news.uthsc.edu, along with other information and announcements

It is a different world now and email accounts are easily available elsewhere. IT will be available to help mitigate some of the challenges and help retirees set up other accounts with other carriers, e.g. Yahoo, Gmail and Microsoft.

Additional Information Received from Ms. Alston Since the Presentation

After last week's session at the Retirees Luncheon, where we discussed impacts of having non-UTHSC email once someone retires from the university. Dan and I have completed the following steps:

- · Reviewed the requests with Executive Administration
- Began to address the condolences list serve with the IT team, adding non-UTHSC email addresses
- · Began to discuss different ways to receive UTHSC daily digest

The institution has decided that we will still remove the options for retirees retaining UTHSC email, but will extend the deadline to add communication and grant additional time for those who would like to migrate messages to a different account. We will continue to investigate the condolences and daily digest listserv options.

Upcoming Email Access Change for Retirees

Thank you for your years of service to UTHSC! We appreciate your contribution to the University. However, with the ever-evolving security concerns, we will be rescinding the option to retain a UTHSC email account on December 31. 2019. Retirees who have returned and are being paid will be unaffected by this change.

Personal email and Office 365 accounts are available through several options such as the following:

- Yahoo
- Microsoft

Listservs and Daily Digest communication will continue to be available by visiting news.uthsc.edu.

If you are a 2019 Retiree, MyUT will continue to be available for W2 retrieval.

If you continue to have a post-retirement association with UTHSC, please contact your prior department's business office to request a sponsored account.
